Synopsis

This term we will be focusing on The Great Fire London of 1666 and the Great Fire of Crediton that started in 1743. We will investigate how these fires started, the factors that meant that they spread and key events that occurred afterwards. We will explore life at the time of the fires and how this has changed, especially regarding fire safety. We will also learn about significant individuals such as Samuel Pepys and how his diary helps us understand what happened during the events of The Great Fire of London.



Key Knowledge

The Great Fire of London started in a Bakery in Pudding Lane on Sunday 2nd September 1666.

The Great Fire of London **destroyed** 13,200 houses, 87 churches and St Pauls Cathedral. 6 people were recorded as having died.

The **The Great Fire of London** was hard to **extinguish** due to the houses being built close together with **timber** roofs and there was no **fire brigade**.

The Great Fire of Crediton started in a house on Sunday 14th August 1743.

The Great Fire of Crediton **destroyed** 460 houses. 16 people died and 2,000 were made homeless.

Samuel Pepys wrote a diary during the time of The Great Fire of London which means we know lots about what happened from them.

2nd September 1666
The Great Fire of London started.

14th August 1743
