What you should know already: Children should already have an understanding of maps, map symbols and keys from our earlier theme of 'Local Landscapes'. In Geography, some children should have been exposed to the 7 continents and 5 oceans and we will be consolidating this knowledge. The children should be able to use an iPad for taking photographs and begin to know where the letters on the keyboard are for typing.

Top Ten Vocabulary	
pirate	a person who attacks and robs ships at sea
continent	a large area of land
ocean	a large area of sea
equator	an imaginary line around the middle of the Earth
map	a diagram of an area of land including physical features and roads etc
compass	an important tool for map readers - it tells us which way is north and where to find east, south and west
map symbol	is a picture or a sign on a map that represents something else
key	helps us to understand map symbols
ariel / birds eye view	view from the air looking down on the Earth
papier mache	a mixture of glue and paper to create a solid 3D structure

Synopsis: We will start this half term with a 'hook' session to excite the children about Pirates. In Geography, the children will be learning about the 7 continents and 5 oceans as well as doing map skills. We will be creating treasure maps with symbols and a key. In our Art project, the children will be creating a 3D papier mache sculpture of their treasure map. As we will be visiting the Golden Hind, the children will learn some important facts about Sir Francis Drake. In Computing, the children will be taking photographs of the steps to make their sculpture to support the writing of their instructions. We will use an app called 'Popplets' to sequence our photographs They will also be practising their typing skills by writing up their instructions.

Key Knowledge

The 7 continents are Asia, Africa, North America, South America, Antarctica, Europe and Australasia. The 5 oceans are the Pacific Ocean, Atlantic Ocean, Indian Ocean, Southern Ocean and Arctic Ocean.

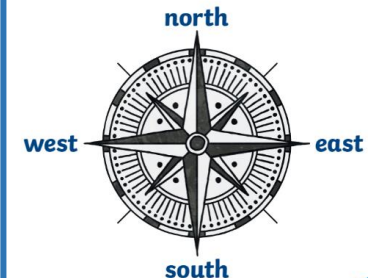
In the world there are two different types of Geography, Human and Physical. Human Geography is landscape created by humans (such as houses, roads, and bridges) and Physical Geography are features which are there without humans (rivers, seas and mountains).

Sir Francis Drake was a Captain in Elizabethan times who was the first Englishman to sail around the entire world, which he did between 1577 and 1580. He sailed around the world aboard his ship, The Golden Hind. After he completed this voyage, he was knighted by Queen Elizabeth I in 1581.



Continents and Oceans

The equator lies half way between the north pole and the south pole. It is hotter near the equator and it gets colder the further away from it you travel whether that is north or south.
